

Success Story MSCA Gives You Freedom!

Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions | Developing Talents, Advancing Research

Jacopo Vialetto is a Postdoc researcher at the ETH Laboratory for Soft Materials and Interfaces.

Once he arrived at the ETHZ, his supervisor, Prof. Lucio Isa, encouraged him to apply for a Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions (MSCA) Postdoctoral Fellowship with which he was immediately successful.



How did you decide to apply for the MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowship?

I already knew about the programme, but I felt it was almost impossible to get the grant. Then Lucio, my supervisor, convinced me to apply by pointing out that even if it were not successful, I would still have a contract in the laboratory.

I therefore had the opportunity to invest 3 months in writing the proposal, and I enjoyed the writing as it was very useful to reflect on my career.

How does the Fellowship help you in building your career?

As suggested by the MSCA, I work with the Career Development Plan: my supervisor and I have yearly meetings to plan how my scientific career can be developed in the best possible way and to improve my CV.

The MSCA Fellowship is a great opportunity to get your own grant and gives you a lot of freedom in your scientific research. Not least, it is the most important grant one can get in Europe as a Postdoc.

How important is the supervisor for your experience in the MSCA Fellowship?

I think the supervisor is extremely important. They help you broaden your perspective and that fosters the scientific discussions and the everyday work. From Lucio, I can also learn how to become a Principal Investigator.

Lucio is also a role model when it comes to organising the group: I really appreciate how he manages to maintain direct contact with each member, despite the fact that the laboratory is constantly growing.

What role did mobility play in your academic career?

After graduating with both a bachelor's and master's degree in Italy, I moved to Paris for my PhD. Now I have been spending my last 3 years as a Postdoc in Zurich.


You gain a lot of experience when you move from one place to another: you have the opportunity to learn other languages and to be part of an international environment.
